# **ELEMENTS OF REPENTANCE**

**TEXT:** Act\_17:30, "And the times of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men every where to repent:"

### INTRODUCTION:

- 1. Repentance is a concept which is easily introduced; and yet which is, for any number of reasons, misunderstood or practiced incorrectly.
- 2. In this lesson we first wish to see the purpose of repentance, contrasting what repentance is not and what it is; second, we wish to see the practice of repentance, contrasting why some do not repent with why some do repent.

#### I. THE PURPOSE OF REPENTANCE.

- A. What repentance is not.
  - 1. Repentance is not merely reacting to having been caught in wrong doing.
    - a. Such is "the sorrow of the world" in <u>2Co\_7:10</u>, which sorrow "worketh death" for it does not motivate a proper reaction to sin.
  - 2. Repentance is not simply changing one's mind.
    - a. Judas repented that he had betrayed Jesus (Mat\_27:3), but only in the sense of changing his mind; few would foolishly argue that he has a place in heaven (cf. Joh 6:70; Act 1:25).
  - 3. Repentance is not simply admitting wrong.
    - a. Like Judas (<u>Mat\_27:4</u>), Pilate knew his actions were wrong (<u>Mat\_27:24</u>)--even before they were committed; few would argue that he ever truly repented.
  - 4. Repentance is not simply paying a price for sin.
    - a. Judas tried to return the price he was paid for betraying Jesus (Mat\_27:3-10); few would argue that he ever truly repented.
      - (1). Act 1:18 speaks of Judas as the purchaser of the field--Scripture never wholly credited him with having returned the money.
  - 5. Repentance is not simply quitting a sin.
    - a. One may stop actively participating in a sin, but never concern himself with changing his affections (<u>Gal\_5:24</u>) or stop enjoying seeing others in that sin (<u>Rom\_1:32</u>).
  - 6. Repentance is not one step salvation.
    - a. Men must believe and confess (Rom 10:10).

- b. Men must be baptized "for the remission of sins" (Act 2:38).
- c. Men must walk faithfully (1Jn\_1:6-7; Rev\_2:10).
- B. What repentance is.
  - 1. Repentance is godly sorrow in action.
    - a. Note the contrast of <u>2Co\_7:10</u>, "For godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of: but the sorrow of the world worketh death."
    - b. The Corinthians' sorrow was a genuine one which motivated them to hate their sinful situation and clear themselves of that weight (2Co 7:11)
  - 2. Repentance is a change of lifestyle.
    - a. Note the penitent son of Mat\_21:28-29 who was not going to work in his father's vineyard but repenting did: "But what think ye? A *certain* man had two sons; and he came to the first, and said, Son, go work to day in my vineyard. He answered and said, I will not: but afterward he repented, and went."
  - 3. Repentance is a Good Father's patient plan for His beloved children
    - a. "The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance" (2Pe 3:9).
    - b. "Or despisest thou the riches of his goodness and forbearance and longsuffering; not knowing that the goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance?" (Rom\_2:4).

## II. THE PRACTICE OF REPENTANCE.

- A. Why some do not repent.
  - 1. Some do not repent because they are so hardened by sin that they cannot even blush.
    - a. Jerusalem had become so degraded that she would be described in this very way: "Were they ashamed when they had committed abomination? nay, they were not at all ashamed, neither could they blush"-- accordingly he inhabitants would "fall among them that fall" (Jer 6:15; Jer 8:12).
    - b. Contrast Ezra's righteous attitude exhibited not due to his own sins, but his people Israel's: "And at the evening sacrifice I arose up from my heaviness; and having rent my garment and my mantle, I fell upon my knees, and

spread out my hands unto the LORD my God, And said, O my God, I am ashamed and blush to lift up my face to thee, my God: for our iniquities are increased over *our* head, and our trespass is grown up unto the heavens" (Ezr 9:5-6).

- 2. Some do not repent because they were never truly convicted and converted.
  - a. "For this people's heart is waxed gross, and *their* ears are dull of hearing, and their eyes they have closed; lest at any time they should see with *their* eyes, and hear with *their* ears, and should understand with *their* heart, and should be converted, and I should heal them" (Mat 13:15).
  - b. "Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord;" (<u>Act\_3:19</u>).
- 3. Some do not repent because they do not want to pay *any* price for sin.
  - a. John upbraided the Pharisees and Sadducees for their insincere attention to his ministry instructing them to "Bring forth therefore fruits meet for repentance:"
     (Mat 3:8).
  - b. "But shewed first unto them of Damascus, and at Jerusalem, and throughout all the coasts of Judaea, and *then* to the Gentiles, that they should repent and turn to God, and do works meet for repentance" (Act 26:20).
- 4. Some do not repent because they do not appreciate or adequately respond to what God, their Father, has done for them.
  - a. "Because that, when they knew God, they glorified *him* not as God, neither were thankful; but became vain in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened" (Rom\_1:21).
- B. Why some do repent.
  - 1. Some repent because it is a command of God.
    - a. "And the times of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men every where to repent:"
      (Act 17:30).
  - 2. Some repent because certain judgment is at hand.
    - a. "Because he hath appointed a day, in the which he will judge the world in righteousness by *that* man whom he hath ordained; *whereof* he hath given assurance unto all *men*, in that he hath raised him from the dead"

(Act 17:31).

- 3. Some repent because they are impressed by the gravity of sin.
  - a. "For the wages of sin *is* death; but the gift of God *is* eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Rom\_6:23).
- 4. Some repent because they are enamored by the idea of liberty from sin.
  - a. "But now being made free from sin, and become servants to God, ye have your fruit unto holiness, and the end everlasting life" (Rom\_6:22).
- 5. Some repent because they recognize the folly of the would-be righteous one's remaining in sin.
  - a. "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid. How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein?" (Rom\_6:1).

## **CONCLUSION:**

- 1. Today, it is possible to understand repentance; more importantly, it is possible to practice repentance.
- 2. If you are in the position of one outside of Christ due to never having obeyed or due to returning to the world of sin, repent and be converted today!
